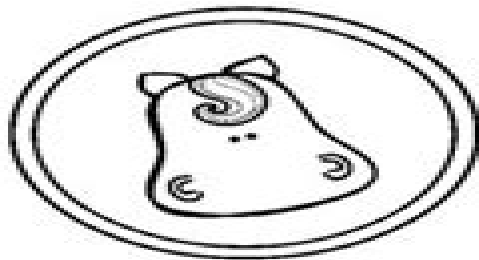


Fables

What is a Fable?

A fable is a type of folk tale that ends with a lesson. The characters are always animals that are able to talk and have human-like behaviors.

Characteristics of Fables



- Only 2-3 characters
- Talking characters
- The setting is usually outside
- Very short story
- There is an element of trickery included
- Lesson or moral will be stated at the end

Why do authors write fables?

Fables are written to entertain their readers. Additionally, all fables have a lesson in them so authors might be trying to persuade their readers to act a certain way based on the lesson in the fable.
